#### **DIRECTORS MEETING JANUARY 4th – SUMMARY**

Present: R. Montgomery, M. Rhodes, P King, B Fane, A. Shirley, P Moore, M. Riches and Company Secretary & Treasurer, Jim McDonell.

The meeting opened with a welcome to returning director Mike Riches

The matter of retrieving society assets and action concerning possible illegal payments was discussed and a plan of action agreed. A decision whether to escalate matters will be deferred for the time being.

Payments to charitable causes were discussed for year 2016-17. The destinations may be reviewed for next year.

It was decided to ask David Beeken to investigate possible options for upgrading toilet facilities which, it was felt, were in need of attention.

It was agreed that a ticketing system should be installed and that an initial print run of 20,000 Edmondsons would be ordered from *Bell Printing*. The council (MF and SM) have been consulted and have no objections. A final design is currently being made up. The club opted to use the reverse of each ticket rather than let the space out. JM to attempt to source a date press.

The Treasurer reported a healthy bank balance and that end of year accounts would soon be prepared. The application to reopen internet banking facilities was under way.

It was noted that NDSMEs insurances do not cover members engines stored at club site. Members should check that their own insurances cover such an eventuality.

A decision was taken to cease operation of the current portable track and offer this for disposal. Suitable ads will be investigated.

The Membership Secretary advised that membership management software may be available to improve membership admin. This would be discussed in greater detail at the next board meeting.

#### Track work – A New Start

After the cessation of ground level sleeper replacement following the disruptions of last summer, a new track team has been assembled to restart sleeper replacement on the main line. A revised method is being adopted. Previously the new plastic sleepers had been used in conjunction with plastic chairs. Whilst this produced aesthetically pleasing trackwork, it did have two significant disadvantages, Firstly, it was time consuming, each length having to be lifted and removed to the workshop for dismantling and reassembly with plastic chairs/sleepers. Secondly, it proved more vulnerable to vandalism than the previous method of screwing rails directly down to sleepers. Last summer, vandals who gained access at night were able to lift rails which then popped out of the chairs just like undoing a zip. Ten lengths were damaged this way.

The cover picture shows Pete King fastening the rails to the new sleepers which have been inserted alongside the old wooden sleepers. This works because the plastic sleepers are fractionally thinner than the wood. It means that the track does not have to be closed while this work is carried out, unlike using the chairs, so work can continue throughout the running season with no disruption. Eventually, the old wood sleepers will be removed *en masse* and the plastic sleepered track fixed down to the base.



#### Coming soon to Eaton Park - The Edmondson Ticket System

Following consultation with the City Council Parks bosses, NDSME has decided to reintroduce a secure and auditable form of ticket system for the miniature railway. This now handles significant sums of money on busy days and it was felt that a "cash in hand" type operation was neither appropriate nor desirable. the opted for historic and proto-typical Edmondson system. Most members will remember the small rectangle of card, date stamped on issue, that used to be issued at booking offices. These had largely vanished in Norwich by the 1970s as machine printed, and later computerised issue took over. There are still a handful of (largely printing enthusiast) suppliers who can produce these and we have chosen Bell Ticket Printing for our first batch. Bell currently other **SMEs** supply Northampton, Oxford and Ickenham as well as other standard, narrow and miniature railways.

In the text below, Bob Proudfoot of Ickenam DSME takes up the history of Edmondson.

"Having become involved in [ordering this system for IDSME] I soon realised that I knew very little about the 'Edmondson Ticket System' so did a little bit of digging – It would appear that the system was the invention of Thomas Edmondson, a former cabinet maker. In 1836 Edmondson changed his career to become Station Master at Milton station (now called Brampton) on the Newcastle & Carlisle railway. It was here that he turned his skills to trying to improve the ticketing system. At the time it was the practice to issue each passenger with a hand written ticket, which was only written out at the time of purchase. Details such as the time of the train and the name of the passenger were recorded. This was a practice carried over from the days of stage coaches. Queues of intending passengers at the booking office could easily build up. Edmondson's first improvement incorporated a device where pre-printed cardboard tickets were held in vertical tubes for each destination, each ticket being raised to the top of the tube by a simple counterweight system. These were numbered by hand. He then devised a finger crushing date stamping system operated by a foot pedal. His real success came when he patented a printing press capable of producing his now standardised ticket style with the serial number printed as well. The serial number forms part of the security of the accounting system in booking offices. At the end of each day a note is made of the serial number of the next unsold ticket of each type. By comparing this to the records for the previous day it was possible to work out the number of tickets of each type sold during the day, and, by extension, how much money had been taken by the booking clerk. Clerks had to account for any discrepancy. Each batch was numbered from zero, so that the number of the next unsold ticket was always equal to the total number of tickets of that type already sold from that batch. IDSME's new batch of tickets has serial numbering for the first time...

By patenting his press, Edmondson was able to charge a royalty to any railway company using his system, at a rate of 10 shillings per annum per mile of route – hence a railway of 100 route miles paid £50 a year in royalties. Edmondson went on to utilise his cabinet making skills and by standardising ticket sizes then engaged in producing the rack design now seen in our own booking office. The Newcastle & Carlisle railway was not enthusiastic about Edmondson's system and so Edmondson embarked on a publicity campaign, which was successful in coming to the ears of the General Superintendent of the, as yet, unopened Manchester & Leeds Railway. latter called at Milton to inspect the system and is said to have offered Edmondson the position of chief booking clerk of the new line there and then. Edmondson took up his new position in May 1839 and was given a free hand to introduce his ticketing system in time for the new line's opening the following July. The system was a great success, and soon spread to many other railway companies. Edmondson left the railway in 1841 to found his own ticket printing business. The company lasted as an independent concern until 1960.

The last Edmondson ticket on the national network was issued in February 1990, just over 150 years after they were first introduced on the Manchester & Leeds Railway."

### From journals past.....



#### 40 years ago, Jan/Feb 1977 newsletter.

Back then the journal was a single foolscap sheet. Items covered included: a bring and buy auction which was recorded to be, "a great success with all kinds of material, tools and other articles changing hands for all kinds of prices!", a talk by Don Gordon on "Small engineering or Big Watchmaking", an argument for the view that the techniques of the watchmaker were more relevant to model engineering than those of the full size engineer. Also covered was a coach trip to the Model Engineer Exhibition at Wembley in early Jan '77, a trip not without incident as, "arrangements went smoothly until we arrived at the new Exhibition Centre at about 1125, just in time to learn, as we joined the queue, that as some 8,000 people were already inside, no more could go in until some came out!". Intriguingly, the article continues, "However, by devious means we gradually gained admission..." It was later noted that, as over 16,000 had attended on that Saturday, the trip would be organised for a different day in future.

Also announced in this newsletter was a trip in April to the *Shuttleworth Collection* at Old Warden Aerodrome, Biggleswade, all-in cost per head expected to be £2.50.

#### 20 Years ago, Jan/Feb 1997 newsletter

By now, this was a multi A4 sheet newsletter, using early DTP applications, under the editorship of Barry Steel. He notes a visit to Olympia when, "the coach was cold on the way there but...this was due to the extreme cold outside". Richard Slipper noted that, "For members waiting [to depart] in sub-zero conditions the sight of a luxury coach was welcome – and fortunately we Norfolkers are a hardy race. No heating, a door which flew open, ice on the windscreen. Self development by endeavour came to mind..." After an enjoyable day, he was pleased to note, "Relief – a warm ride home to Norwich clutching my carrier bag. "What did you buy dear?" "Oh... er – two pieces of steel, some files, a scriber, square and dividers". "What for?" "I'm going to make something". And that level of explanation was, apparently, enough...

In the same newsletter it was recorded that there was insufficient demand for T-shirts to make it a viable proposition. Probably a wise move as, in your scribes opinion, T-shirts are strictly for the young!

Finally, some things never change –in an endpiece, Barry Steel commented in the newsletter, "I have had little response to my plea for contributions to this Newsletter", a situation that continues to this day! Unless you know otherwise!
